"Bound To Give Thanks" - 2 Thes. 1:3-5

1. Paul was "bound" to give thanks for the Thessalonian brethren. (2 Thes.1:3)

- A. Bound Defined as: Under obligation; debt owed.
- B. Paul felt a moral obligation to tell them and others that his prayers were answered and that their lives demonstrated it. 1 Thes. 3:11-13.
 - i. To increase and abound in love toward each other and all men.
 - ii. Establish your hearts without blame in holiness.

II. Paul gloried in them (2 Thes 1:4)

- A. Their faith was already well known 1 Thes 1:8
 - i. They sounded forth the word of God in Macedonia, Achaia, and in every place they went forth.

III. Paul gloried of them in other congregations (2Thes. 1:4)

- A. This glorification was not to be boastful with arrogance.
- B. We can and should boast of things that glorify God. Ps. 44:8
- C. This glorification of the Thessalonians was to encourage other congregations to follow their example.
 - i. Many congregations were surrounded by Pagans and persecutors. The needed much encouragement.

IV. Reasons for Paul's Glorying for the Thessalonians

- A. Persecutions and afflictions They endured them.
 - i. They received the word in much affliction with joy 1 Thes. 1:6
 - ii. Acts 17:5-9 Example of the kind of persecutions they faced.
 - a) Jealousy from Paul's preaching set the city in an uproar.
 - b) The house of Jason where Paul stayed was assaulted.
 - c) The mob dragged Jason and certain brethren before the rulers of the city.
 - d) They were accused of harboring troublemakers, disobeying Caesar's decrees and saying that Jesus was another king to Caesar.
 - e) The rulers took security from them and let them go. Bond money.

- B. Persecutions develops patience endurance; steadfastness.
 - i. Rom. 5:3-5 Tribulations increases steadfastness and steadfastness increases hope.
 - ii. James 5:11 Those that endure are called blessed
 - a) The endurance of Job demonstrates that God is full of pity and mercy in the end.
- C. Faith and patience support each other. 2 Thes. 1:4
 - i. James 1:3 When our faith is put to the test, it increases our endurance and steadfastness. (1 Pet. 1:6-7)
 - a) James 1:4 Let our steadfastness increase to perfection that we may not be lacking in anything.
 - ii. Jude 20-21 Our faith is one that we ourselves also must build up.
 - a) Not only through trials.
 - b) Through spiritual growth and prayers.
 - Study, Prayer and Meditation Joshua 1:8
- D. Revelation describes the patience and steadfastness of the saints Rev. 14:12
 - i. They will keep the commandments of God.
 - ii. They will keep the faith of Christ Jude 3

V. Manifest token of the righteous judgment of God - 2 Thes. 1:5

- A. So done, that we may prove worthy of the kingdom of heaven
 - i. Remember, our weakness is when we become strong in Christ 2 Cor. 12:9-10

VI. Be counted worthy of the kingdom of Heaven - 2 Thes 1:5

- A. These trials discipline us to be the kind of people to be found worthy by God. 1 Thes. 2:11-12; Col. 1:9-11
- B. To be found worthy to receive the Promise Heb. 10:36
